Use another card when an inbox has different ownership, permissions, or rules.

CURRENT PRODUCT BOUNDARY

An inbound email Agent cannot create or edit provider drafts, send, reply, reply-all, forward, or make arbitrary integration requests. It can use attachment metadata, not attachment contents. Gmail replies can attach supported files; current Outlook replies cannot, although new Outlook sends can.

Write the Two-Lane Inbox contract

Separate safe observation from outward action, then name the human owner at every decision point.

WEB ASSISTANT

Send, reply, and forward are code-gated for confirmation.

Lane A may classify, summarize, flag, label or file, notify the owner, and put proposed wording in a Delivery. Lane B is a separate trusted run with written authority and any configured gate.

HUMAN TAKEOVER AND RELEASE CONTRACT

THE RULE THAT PREVENTS DOUBLE-SENDING

Before an outward action, reread current mailbox state, approval state, and ownership.

If a human has acted or taken over, the agent stops until an explicit release.

NO NATIVE SHARED-MAILBOX ASSIGNMENT CLAIM

A shared address may involve provider-side identity and permissions. This card does not claim a Praxivara assignment queue, collision lock, or native shared-inbox ownership system.

Pass all 18 inbox failure tests

Check a box only after reproducing the failure and verifying the expected recovery or safe stop.

PASS STANDARD: no duplicate outward action, no wrong-recipient action, and an evidence trail for every recovery.

☐ 01 Correct mailbox scope Connect the intended Gmail or Outlook mailbox, not an administrator's personal account.	☐ 10 Human takeover persistence Takeover survives later events and remains active until an authorized human releases it.
☐ 02 Duplicate provider event Replay the same event. It must not create a second outward action or conflicting state.	☐ 11 Wrong recipient or sender identity Verify recipient plus visible From, Sender, Reply-To, signature, and public identity.
☐ 03 Stale event after human action After a human replies, moves, or closes the item, current state must win over the stale event.	☐ 12 Shared-address send authority Where external shared-address permissions apply, verify Send As versus Send on Behalf authority.
☐ 04 Gmail history-gap recovery Simulate an invalid or missing history cursor. Reconcile with a bounded full sync.	☐ 13 Uncertain send state Separate accepted, provider sent-record, bounce, reply, and final resolution. Never retry blindly.
☐ 05 Expired or interrupted event path Expire a Gmail watch or interrupt Outlook polling. Restore the path and reconcile the missed window.	☐ 14 Prompt injection and attachments Treat body, quoted text, links, filenames, and metadata as untrusted. Inbound attachment bytes are not parsed.
☐ 06 Outlook move and message ID Move a message and confirm any changed identifier cannot attach work to an unrelated message.	☐ 15 Sensitive-content escalation Route legal, financial, credential, health, personnel, and other protected topics to a human.
☐ 07 Own-send or out-of-office loop An employee's own sent mail or an automatic OOO reply must not start a reply loop.	☐ 16 Opt-out stops queued outreach A valid opt-out must suppress future outreach and cancel queued marketing where required.
☐ 08 Reply during review A new reply arriving while proposed wording or a provider draft awaits review must make it stale.	☐ 17 Access revocation and retention Revoke provider access, remove schedules, and apply the written retention and deletion policy.
☐ 09 Shared-address collision If several people watch one address, only one actor may commit the outward action.	☐ 18 Sender authentication alignment Verify SPF, DKIM, DMARC, and alignment for the domain shown in the actual From header.

Shared-address tests validate external identity and authority. They do not imply native assignment queues.

Run the 30-day scorecard

OFFBOARDING DRILL DATE

DECISION, RECOVERY EVIDENCE, AND OFFBOARDING NOTES

RECOVERY AND OFFBOARDING MUST BE REVERSIBLE

Pause runs, revoke provider access, confirm Gmail watch or Outlook polling has stopped, retain evidence, and delete data by policy.
